

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
Pharmacy Registrations

Proper pharmacy registrations are difficult to fully understand—in addition to federal registration, some states require different licenses/registrations than others. For instance, depending on the state of the pharmacy, they may need to apply for:

- 1. Drug Enforcement Administration ("DEA") license
- 2. State pharmacy license
- 3. State business license
- 4. Registered agent registration



Disciplinary Action Process





Disciplinary Actions

The following are common disciplinary action triggers:

- Insufficient or lapsed licenses
- Dispensing medications without a valid prescription
 - Heightened scrutiny when controlled substances are involved
- Safety / medication handling violations
- Record-keeping violations
- Errors in pill counts
- Discipline in other states

Disciplinary Actions

Non-Resident Pharmacy

Conduct

Failed to renew Missouri license

Committed safety violations in California

Failed to obtain license in Kansas before shipping prescriptions to Kansas

Result

License revoked and pharmacy barred from reapplying for seven years

Surrendered licenses in California and Wisconsin

Required to pay a fine to the Kansas Board of Pharmacy



Abide by the terms of the settlement/final order Disclose the discipline

- What needs to be disclosed?
 - The states have different disclosure requirements depending on the discipline
- How does the discipline need to be disclosed?
 - Some states require disclosure affirmatively within a pre-determined time-period
 - Some states require disclosure upon a licensure renewal application



In general, pharmacies operating in multiple states must apply for "non-resident pharmacy" licenses/registrations (or the state's equivalent to a non-resident pharmacy) in each state it seeks to operate in

- Except Massachusetts
- States have different rules for when a license is required (ex: isolated transactions vs regular business)

The application process usually involves:

- Initial applications
- Renewal applications
 - Some states require renewals annually, every two years, etc.

On initial and renewal applications, questions about disciplinary actions are often asked



- 5. Has any owner, partner, officer or the pharmacist-in-charge ever been, or is now, addicted to any drugs, controlled substances or alcoholic beverages?
- 6. Has any owner, partner, officer or the pharmacist-in-charge ever had an application for a pharmacy technician, pharmacist, pharmacy intern, pharmacy, drug distributor or any other healthcare registration, license, permit, or certificate denied, disciplined or refused in this state, or any other state or country? (If yes, copies of any denial/refusal/disciplinary documents must be provided)
- 7. Has any owner, partner, officer or the pharmacist-in-charge <u>ever</u> had any controlled substance registration, license, permit, or certificate <u>denied</u>, <u>disciplined</u> or <u>refused</u> in this state, or any other state or country? (If yes, copies of any denial/refusal/disciplinary documents must be provided)
- 8. Has any owner, partner, officer or the pharmacist-in-charge <u>ever</u> been adjudged insane or incompetent by or in any state, country or court?



ANSWER THE FOLLOWING QUESTIONS: (attach additional sheet(s) if necessary)

- 1. Has any licensing or other credentialing agency ever taken any disciplinary action against you, including but not limited to any warning, reprimand, suspension, probation, limitation, or revocation? If yes, attach a sheet providing details about the action, including the name of the credentialing agency and date of action.
- 2. Is disciplinary action pending against you in any jurisdiction? If yes, attach a sheet providing details about pending action, including the name of the agency and status of action.


